Tripods are NOT ALLOWED in the Portrait Gallery so we will experiment with hand-held panoramic shooting. There are lockers we can use in the Portrait Gallery for our tripods.

If it's a sunny clear day, I will likely walk down to the National Mall for some additional pano shooting of the building fronts outside. Feel free to join.

His photographic adventures have immersed him in vivid landscapes on all seven continents and in more than 60 countries around the world. Whether capturing 360-degree panoramas of wildlife along an African savanna or photographing sharks in the Pacific depths, Jeff's work expresses an unwavering passion for the natural world. Jeff will be sharing photo tips from his travels to the back and beyond. And, he just returned from a trip to South Georgia and the Falklands, so expect lots of penguin images!



His images have appeared in hundreds of publications, including over a dozen National Geographic books, several National Geographic Traveler Magazine articles (United Kingdom and

Korea), several Lonely Planet guidebooks, BBC Travel, Washingtonian magazine, Virginia Tourism, and numerous other publications. And, some of you may have seen him speak at the Nature Visions Photo Expo last November.

In addition to assignment work, Jeff is also a seasoned and popular photography expert, guiding and lecturing on natural history-focused trips around the world for <u>National</u> <u>Geographic Expeditions</u>. He will also be teaching a 7-day <u>Photography Workshop in Costa Rica</u> in April and November 2019.

Jeff lives in northern Virginia with his wife, daughter, and rescue greyhound.

Splinters from the Board

People join, and continue to participate in, camera clubs for a variety of reasons. As a result, one of the largest challenges is providing services that meet the needs and wants of the membership. NBCC is one of the largest camera clubs in the DC metropolitan area, and in general its membership is quite stable (hence the traditionally long time on the wait list!) My suspicion is most of you have not read our constitution, but might find it interesting that in Article II, "Purpose and objectives", we have 5 specific objectives that inform how we execute our duties as members of the board.

One of those objectives is to "cooperate with other camera clubs and organizations interested in photography". As big as our club is, there is a bigger world out there and we are proud to be a part of it. For many years, we have been affiliated with the Photographic Society of America (PSA). This does require an additional membership, but makes available even more learning opportunities than we can provide within NBCC. Judy Burr has graciously been our club representative to that organization for many years, and I'm sure if you have any interest or questions, she would be most willing to provide input!

More recently, we became a participating member of the Nature Visions organization. From an individual perspective, this provides our club members with an incredibly reasonably priced learning opportunity with a weekend of speakers, and an opportunity to purchase equipment at incredible discounts. It takes active participation from the clubs to make this event work, and John Norvell and Steve Silverman have actively supported this by being a part of that organization throughout the year for several years now.

Most recently we have become a participating member of the Maryland Photographic Alliance. Through this organization, there are both specific events in which we can participate, but also a huge opportunity for collegiality to benefit the photography community in general. Since its inception (actually before it if I remember correctly!), Carol Lee has been involved in this organization as our representative and a huge proponent of inter-club collegiality. The challenges we face in our club are faced by other clubs as well; NBCC just happens to be incredibly well-organized and proactive in addressing them. To that end, Roy Sewall was selected to lead a training course on judging to help build a larger/better base of well-trained judges for the local camera clubs to have access to. Our process of taking postcompetition surveys is unique among clubs, and Bruce Cyr has been working with MPA president Steve Sattler to establish a structure that all the member clubs can take advantage of. Lastly, our major speaker events (John Barclay in the past, stay tuned for future!) are being supported by MPA to extend opportunities across club borders. Thanks to Gail Bingham for working this major effort. Huge thanks to these folks for not only being an integral part of NBCC's organizational success, but also for reaching out to that bigger community (while still being excellent photographers!).

Periodically we look at the various aspects of our club and see which types of membership can/should be able to participate in each. Recently we revisited the Photo Essay, which had not allowed Emeritus members to submit. That restriction is eliminated, so stay tuned for next year's roster!

PSA News

All NBCC members are invited to attend the Mid-Atlantic Chapter meeting on March 23. Normally chapter events are for Individual PSA members only, but the chapter would like to include club members to attend this special meeting featuring some excellent speakers. Meeting location is at Leisure World in Silver Spring from 9 AM to 4:30 PM in Clubhouse Two, meeting room 2. It is easier to enter from Norbeck Road. Just tell the guard you are there for a camera club event.

In the morning feature program, **The Call of the North – Canadian Rockies**, "Bernard Chen will discuss about his two recent trips to the magnificent Canadian Rockies this past September and January. In addition to presenting his outstanding images and videos captured during these trips, he will discuss photos tips, trip preparation and trail details that might be of interest to everyone interested in visiting the Canadian Rockies. I have heard Mr. Chen in the past and he is an excellent speaker and photographer."

The description of the afternoon program, **Zambia**, **South Africa wildlife and Kenya migration adventures**, is "Africa is the photographers' paradise. Henry will present the images captured during his 21-days photo trips to three African countries (Zambia, South Africa and Kenya) in July 2018. He will discuss the different subjects available in these countries including the trip preparation, equipment and transportation needs, living conditions, and photo tips." Henry is a top world photographer and has spoken at NBCC in the past.

Recent **PSA Journal** issues have had some interesting articles. The December issue has an article about using a smart phone as a travel camera. It is written by William Barnett, APSA, GMPSA, who has traveled all over the world and is a regular participant in the Travel Essay Competition. He used a lot of video. He recommends the 645 Pro camera for an iPhone.

The March issue includes a review of Photo Mechanic 5.0, a media browser that enables a photographer to go through images faster that most processors. There is also an extensive article on Snapseed. which is an iPhone app that is probably one of the best image processors for phones. Sharp Todd, HonPSA, GMPSA/B, wrote an article titled, "Printing for Exhibitions," which is highly recommended for all printers. He is a top printer and explains why he feels prints show more than digital images. He uses paper from Costco and does very well in International Exhibitions with it.

The 2019 PSA Annual Conference will be held in Spokane, WA in late September and some featured speakers have been announced. They include Nevada Wier, who travels all over the world and leads trips to some unusual places. The Baltimore CC featured her along with Lisl Dennis in a wonderful day-long program years ago. Cole Thompson is a repeat speaker who gave a very good program several years ago. Lewis Kemper, sponsored by Tamron and a contributing editor to Outdoor Photographer will also present an evening program.

PSA Member News

Larry Mars continues to earn acceptances in in several Divisions of PSA in International Exhibitions; he is entering exhibitions far and wide. He had 3 acceptances in Travel in an exhibition in Montenegro, and 12 accepted in Serbia in monochrome, nature, and travel. Larry then went across the world to gain 19 acceptances in China with 5 in monochrome, 7 nature and 7 in travel. All that and he said he has taken time off from entering! **Judy Burr** has been concentrating on exhibitions in India, which offers many different ones. The best news was receiving a gold medal from the Federation of Indian Photography in the Concord Exhibition to go with her 6 acceptances. Judy also had 2 PJ images accepted in the Craftsman Circuit, 4 in the Photomatic, 8 in the Winter Circuit and 12 in the Monsoon Circuit. The best results were in the Bengal Grand Prix Circuit with a total of 36 with 8 Photo Travel, 8 in Nature, 6 in color, and 14 in the 2 sections of Monochrome. Pictures of grandchildren gave Judy 8 of all those acceptances.

I used Lightroom to crop the image, remove some of the overhanging leaves and enhance the sunset.

"I See the Light" was taken at the Washington National Cathedral during their annual evening laser light show with an Olympus OM-D M5, 7-14 Pro Lens. I was one of 60 photographers shooting the laser light show inside. When it ended and I walked outside, I saw the light show was also on the facade. I waited until there were interesting groups of people in front of the Cathedral and shot several photos of the ever-changing colors.

I was on the Mall during the recent snowfall in DC that covered the statues of the Korea War Memorial in a heavy coating of snow. The snow added to the realism of the sculptures where the soldiers were struggling through the arduous conditions of the Korean War. While visiting the Modern and Contemporary Art wing of this amazing museum, I found a spot atop one of the stairs that goes down from the Concourse level to the Concourse Galleries that has an interesting view of the entrance to the special exhibitions. I felt that the elegant simplicity of this entrance (framed by white walls, a neutral grayish floor, a band of marble tiles on the right side and a small contemporary desk in the background, all of them in similar soft pastel tones) made an ideal spot to frame a photograph. I decided to position myself with my camera there and to wait for some action or interesting scene to develop.

2nd Place Terrell Place Abstract © **Bruce Davis**

"Terrell Place Abstract" was taken in the lobby of a condominium building. The interior walls and corridors are "an interactive media canvas" activated by passersby. LEDs provide the light for moving shapes and images. You won't see my image if you go there because the display changes constantly.

I took this picture of an apartment building on Connecticut Avenue in DC's Kalorama neighborhood. I converted the image to b&w and post-processed the image in Photoshop in tribute to Greek photographer Julia Anna Gospadarou. Shot with a Canon EOS R camera and EF 28mm f/2.8 lens. Exposure was 1/125 sec @ f/11 and ISO 400.

This photo of the Washington Monument was taken from a gallery atop the new Bible Museum overlooking the DC skyline. It was taken in the early afternoon and there were few visitors in the hall.

1st Place Modern Cliff Dwelling © **Tammy Trocki**

This is the entrance of the Museum of the American Indian on the National Mall. I took this shot using a 14mm lens and so was able to capture most of the breadth of the façade close-up in a single shot. I was struck initially by the beautiful upsweeping curves of the building and the contrast of the yellows and blues in the scene. Later, it dawned on me that the design from this angle must be a conscious nod to the Anasazi cliff dwellings in the Southwest, such as the White House in Canyon de Chelly.

This image was hand-held to capture the geometric objects within the circle. Much manipulation in Photoshop CC to emphasize/sharpen the objects and soften/darken the background. Several iterations of perspective and color editing using mainly the RAW filter to "square-up" the image and mute the background figures.

3rd Place Looking Up © **John Norvell**

This image was captured at the Smithsonian National Museum of Natural History where I volunteer each week. The mounted elephant is one of the most familiar sights to DC visitors and I have photographed it several times. Last week I tried again using my fisheye lens from a low angle and close to a foot for a different view.
