Henry Ng was born in China and was raised in Hong Kong. He immigrated to the United States at the age of 18 in 1968. Henry is an international well known photographer and has been involved in photography for more than 35 years. His interest in Photography started when he was 13 years old and he particularly likes photographing people, landscapes, human-interest subjects, nature, sports and creative work. He is actively participating in the International Exhibition of Photography competitions (also known as an International Salon) from all over the world and has an exceptional international competition record. He was ranked among the top exhibitors in the world in the Who's Who in Photography published Photographic Society of America (PSA) numerous times. These honors include 5th in the

## **Member Profile**

**Angelique Raptakis** 

As far back as her mind can stretch, Angelique Raptakis remembers being intrigued by photography and the possibilities offered by the photo image. As a child, she perused the albums of her grandparents which gave her a sense of her family and of their life in Greece before they settled in America.

Her father was an avid slide photographer and documented travels and family life. He met and married Angelique's mother in Greece where he was stationed with the U.S. Air Force. After returning to America, the couple had three children, two girls and a boy, of which Angelique is the youngest. They still reside in Silver Spring and celebrate every holiday with their children. About two years ago, Angelique purchased a house of her own, in the same neighborhood in which she was raised.

Angelique attended Good Counsel High School and, upon graduation, matriculated at the University of West Virginia in Morgantown. She liked the geography of the state and of the Morgantown area, a strong motivation in her

choice of colleges. She received her BA in Psychology in 1999.

After graduation, she began working two jobs. During the day, she was a logistics coordinator for a government contractor, Capital Consulting Corporation. In the evenings, she worked for the Montgomery County Department of Corrections, Pre Release Services, assisting case workers. After an arduous year, Capital Consulting "won out" by offering Angelique a job as an event planner and also the title of "official photographer." Since their clients often needed portraits of their executives or group photographs of event attendees, Angelique's skills are in demand. Occasionally she even sells images for reproduction in newsletters or on websites.

For this work, she uses a digital camera, a Canon 30 D, recently upgrading to a Canon 1D Mark II N. She uses on-camera flash, a Speedlite 580 EX. She owns both Gitzo and Manfrotto tripods with Kirk Bh-C and Arcatech GV2 ball heads, but doesn't use this equipment as often as she should. She is trying to become more disciplined with it. Mostly she relies on natural light with the occasional help from the Speedlite to allow a quick enough shutter speed to hand-hold her camera.

In her spare time, Angelique has always found plenty of subjects to photograph. In 1993, she purchased a Nikon point-and-shoot to go into her backpack. A friend, her older sister, and Angelique made a trip to Europe, traveling from England, through Holland, France, Germany, Austria, and Italy to finally end up with family in Greece. Although they spoke only English, Greek and a little French, they managed to make their way about, riding Euro rail

and saying in hostels. Angelique documented their journey with her Nikon.

In 2000, she purchased her first "real" camera, a Canon Rebel 2000. With this, she began to do "street photography" in D.C., and captured the sights on a vacation trip to NYC. She also did some event photography for friends and relatives.

Now, one of her main interests is macro photography, particularly portraits of insects. She likes to get very close to them so she can capture their features, colors and textures. For this, she uses a MP-E 65mm 1-5X magnification lens with complete manual focus. She says it takes a lot of patience to get a good image of a bug.

Angelique processes her images with Adobe Camera Raw and in Photoshop CS3. She used to have them printed on MPix.com, but has recently purchased an Epson 3800 to do her own printing. At present, she favors Epson Photo Lustre paper but is eager to experiment with other paper types.

While researching area camera clubs, Angelique discovered the NBCC on the Internet. At that time, the membership was full. A year later, her friend and Club member, Rakesh Malik, encouraged her to attend meetings. She was present at several events last year and became a full member in 2007. She enjoys seeing other peoples' work and learning how differing points of view can effect the images. She also likes the feedback from judges on her images during competition night.

While waiting to join NBCC, Angelique also joined the Silver Spring Camera Club. She is now secretary of this group. Since their members compete only in slides and prints, she is encoura-

ging them to try electronic competition and has received assistance from Tom Field on this project.

Angelique competes in both Novice Color Prints and Novice Electronic. Her image, *Backward Glance* taken at a Renaissance Festival, won first place in November, and was also accepted for the Sandy Spring exhibit in January. A couple more of her images won awards at the December Competition night.

As to her aspirations for a full-time career in photography, Angelique feels that she has the passion and the interest, she just needs more skills. Towards this goal, she is planning to attend a seminar with Rod Planck in Michigan next summer, and a workshop with Tony Sweet in the fall.

Angelique has sold many of the images she has taken at baptisms and weddings. She has a commission coming up soon to do a friend's wedding. She also

sells images taken as part of her day job. Occasionally she sells an image she has taken "just to suit herself" and that, she says, is the most satisfying sale of all.

Angelique tries to see the beauty in her environment, particularly the commonplace that is easily overlooked, from the colors of the setting sun to the intricate patterns in the eye of a butterfly, to the grace of a withering floral bloom. She believes that beauty is everywhere and we can see it once we fully open our eyes.

## **Evaluating the Experimental Year**

Last spring the Board voted to use the 2007-2008 Program Year to experiment with consolidating what had been the practice since the Club's inception of holding two consecutive competition nights – the first and second Wednesdays of each month – into one Competition Night per month to be held on the first Wednesday. The second Wednesday then would be used as a Workshop Night devoted to experimenting with different topics and different formats. Feedback forms would be used to help fine tune the events during the year.

The recommendation for the Experimental Year came from a Special Study Committee headed by Evelyn Jacob and composed of Melissa Clark, Joel Hoffman, Kent Mason, Bob Peavy, Tom Sullivan, and Judy Switt. The committee was charged with evaluating how the Club was fulfilling its constitutional purpose and objectives – providing opportunities for learning and exchanging ideas about photography, providing programs and competitions, and offering constructive critiques and suggestions. A survey indicated that 60 percent of the membership supported one competition night per month and provided a wealth of information regarding membership interests.

To evaluate the success of this year's changes in better meeting the constitutional objectives of the Club, the Board at its December meeting approved an ambitious evaluation schedule designed to provide it with the views of an informed membership and other data.

To organize the evaluation process and gather information needed by the Board on issues it would

like to examine, the Special Study Committee was re-activated. A survey of the membership is planned for distribution on March 20, to be turned in by April 11. In the meantime, articles in both the February and March newsletter editions will highlight a number of issues to be considered in the survey from various perspectives. The Board, at its regular February, March, and April meetings will discuss and refine the evaluation process, and then hold a special one-issue meeting on April 30 to make a final decision on the structure of Club programming for Program Year 2008-2009.

In making the final determination, the Board needs to know what the membership thinks regarding not only the changes made this year -- the consolidation of competitions into one night, the Workshop Night experiment, consolidation of Altered Images into only the projection format, time management considerations, etc. – but any others ideas that need to be addressed to improve provided Club services. Members are encouraged to make their views known to the Special Study Committee members over the next few months.

General Motors was once the envy of the automotive world. At times there was even a waiting list to get a Chevy. Unfortunately for GM, its Board did not see the need to change to meet the expectations of the next generation. Taking a different approach, the NBCC Board hopes to keep its ear to the ground and its finger on the membership pulse.

This is Ellis Rosenberg's first appearance at the North Bethesda Camera Club. An amateur photographer for over 40 years, he is currently Chair of the Reston Photographic Society and is a board member of The League of Reston Artists that includes the RPS. He also currently serves on the board of The Meadowlark Photo Expo. Ellis has been designated as "The Official Photographer" on a number of occasions for diverse groups of people and organizations. He is a recent graduate of The Joe Miller Seminar on Judging, and is eager to put the knowledge gained from the seminar together with his experience as a competition judge. (NBCC's Judy Switt and Roy Sewell are also graduates of the seminar.) Ellis' most recent judging assignments have been with the Gaithersburg Camera Club, the Loudon Photo Club, and the Vienna Photographic Society.

Ellis offers the following criteria that he uses as a camera club judge: "My first consideration would be conformity with the rules of the competition. Next would be the three C's – craftsmanship, composition and creativity. The judging should be a learning experience for everyone involved, including the judge. Negative aspects should be minimized while focusing on the positive attributes of the work. Originality, uniqueness, feeling, mood and capturing the moment would hold a prominent place in the selection criteria."

## **Hint Found on the Internet**

When working with a layer (background layer or a subsequent copy) that has a selection made, "Ctrl-J" duplicates only the selection but "drag-to-duplicate layer-icon" duplicates the entire layer with the selection showing. I use one or the other of those two methods depending on what I'm trying to accomplish.

This is very true. If you have a selection active when you create a new layer from copy (either by choosing Layer > New Layer Via Copy from the menu or by holding Ctrl/Command while pressing J on the keyboard) the new layer will consist of only the selected pixels. While this is helpful in the sense that you can duplicate only the pixels you need (thus helping to reduce the growth in file size), I actually prefer to avoid this process, duplicating the entire layer instead. While this does increase the file size significantly, it also maximizes your flexibility in terms of layer masking.

If you're particularly concerned about file size, you can still use the select and duplicate method to minimize the growth in file size. However, in that case I strongly recommend that you create a very rough selection that includes more of the area than you think you'll need. Then, after duplicating just those pixels add a layer mask to fine-tune the result so you can only see the pixels you really want. This way, if you find out you made a mistake with your original selection or mask, you can always adjust the layer mask instead of having to start over.

## **Hint: Action-stopping Rules**

To stop action moving across the frame that's perpendicular to the lens axis, you need shutter speeds two stops faster than action moving toward or away from you. For action moving at a 45-degree angle to the lens axis, you can use a shutter speed one stop slower. For example: If a person running toward you at moderate speed can be stopped at 1/125 sec, you'll need a shutter speed of 1/500 sec to stop the subject moving across the frame, and a shutter speed of 1/250 sec to stop him if moving obliquely with respect to the camera.

## <u>January Field Trip – Udvar-Hazy Center</u>

January 26, 2007, 8:00 AM

The NBCC January Field trip is to the Steven F. Udvar-Hazy Air and Space Annex near Washington Dulles International Airport. This is the companion facility to the Air and Space Museum on the National Mall. The building opened in December, 2003, and provides enough space for the Smithsonian to display the thousands of aviation and space artifacts that cannot be exhibited on the National Mall. The two sites together showcase the largest collection of aviation and space artifacts in the world.

A newer section of the Center is the <u>James S. McDonnell Space Hangar</u>. The centerpiece of the space hangar is the Space Shuttle *Enterprise*. Other space artifacts include the Gemini VII space capsule; the Mobile Quarantine Unit used upon the return of the Apollo 11 crew; and a Redstone rocket.

By special arrangements, NBCC participants will be allowed into the facility 2 hours prior to the facility being opened to the public. We will be the only individuals in the facility during this time period. Tripods will be permitted but only during this 2-hour time period. After 10:00 AM when the public is admitted, tripods will have to be put away, but monopods will be permitted. Flash lighting is permitted

throughout the day. Our escort during this special advanced opening will be Scott Willey. Scott is a full-time docent at the Center, and is a highly acclaimed photographer in his own right. Scott has an intimate knowledge of the Center and all of the artifacts contained there. He will be eager to share information, offer photographic suggestions and answer any questions that may come up.

Directions to the Udvar Hazy Center: From Bethesda: I-495 West (Capital Beltway) to the Dulles Toll Road West (Route 267). Exit the toll road at Route 28 South (Exit 9A) and travel south 3.5 miles. Exit at Air and Space Museum Parkway and follow the signs to the Steven F. Udvar-Hazy Center.



Enter the parking lot at Gate 5, which is the gate furthest to the right. The guard will have a list of the names of participants so he knows the folks are really part of the group. Right after the gate, take the first left and a quick right to get into the parking lot (if you go straight, you will come up in front of the building and will have to drive all around the parking lot in order to get down into the lot.)

Individuals who have been identified as participants and are on the advanced list of participants will get free parking, others will have to pay the daily parking rate which is \$12.00.

members who attended seemed to really enjoy the venue and the images presented. An example of one of the Bodies of Work is given by Sigrid Vollerthun's collection below:









On Wednesday, January 9th, forty-six NBCC photographers will have their images featured in an exhibition opening that day at the Sandy Spring Museum entitled Photographic Visions: Images from the North Bethesda Camera Club.

The Museum is located at 17901Bentley Road, Sandy Spring in Montgomery County, MD. Framed prints, ready for hanging, must be delivered to the Museum between 9 and 10 a.m. on Monday, January 7<sup>th</sup>, two days before the exhibit opens. I discovered that by making the canvas size bigger the black border shows up on the edge of the canvas. This solves a printing problem I was having, but I don't understand where this border is coming from.

When you enlarge the canvas (Image > Canvas Size) for an image that has a Background image layer, the new area created around the image itself will be filled with the background color (defined by the color picker on the Tools palette). By default that means the new space will be white, which for a printed image means it will be "invisible". Of course, if you change the background color to something else, it means you'll have a border around your image (and this is how the Canvas Size option is used to create a matted image look by applying it multiple times with different colors).

If there isn't a Background image layer (for example, if you have double-clicked the layer and clicked OK to convert the layer to a "normal" layer) the new area added to the image will be transparent, regardless of the current background color.

The lens that looks at a sunset, a flower, a dramatic landscape or a smile of a child and really gets "turned on" is not the lens in front of the camera. Rather, it's the lens inside the photographer.

We all know about grammar in the English language. We know where to place the commas and the periods. What is important is to do as the writer does. He is not as concerned about where the comma goes as he is about the words flowing from his heart. The writer makes grammar the secondary thing, just as the photographer makes the mechanics a secondary thing and concentrates on the importance of what he's feeling and trying to "say" with his photographs.

Photographs speak in a strong language. They can bring out a person's raw emotions and can make someone happy, sad and even angry. Photographs can stir people to action or just make us feel good. They can make visible what others can only sense. Remember it's not the brush of the artist that produces the painting, not the bow of the violin that produces the music nor the pen of the poet that writes the sonnets nor the camera which produces the photograph.

## **Sunset Rule**

To get a properly exposed sunset, meter the area directly above the sun (without including the sun). If you want the scene to look like it's a half-hour later, stop down by one f-stop, or set exposure compensation to minus one.

## **Quick Flash-fill Rule**

When using an automatic flash unit that doesn't provide auto flash-fill ratios, set the flash's ISO dial to twice the ISO you're using. Meter the scene, select an f-stop, set the autoflash aperture to the same f-stop, and shoot. The resulting 2:1 flash-fill ratio will produce filled shadows one stop darker than the main subject.

Making the tone of one photo match another

Open the photo you want to repair or match. Find the photo you want it to match. Go back to the photo you want to repair or match and under the menu under Adjustments choose Match Color. At the bottom of the dialogue box choose the Source Photo that you want to match. As long as the preview button is turned on you will see the effect instantly. You can then use the Luminance slider to adjust the overall brightness or decrease the saturation. Very slick!!

If you have the new CS3 and use the wonderful Quick Selection tool try this: After selecting a small area of the subject you want to select hold Alt (Option) and trace around this subject not touching the part you want to select. This tells Photoshop what you do not want selected and then the further selection is going to be much quicker and more accurate.

## **Tim Grey Comment on Print Preview**

You have spent two days now discussing workflow related to cropping and resizing. However, perhaps because it is "obvious," you have not mentioned any of the details related to resizing. In particular, are you a believer in the "rule" to resize in increments not exceeding 10%? Also, what is your opinion of third party resizing tools such as Genuine Fractals?

I didn't go into great detail about the resizing process because it is indeed relatively straightforward. The short explanation is to go to Image > Image Size in Photoshop. Make sure all three checkboxes at the bottom left of the dialog box are selected, and then enter values for Width, Height, and Resolution (use 360 for printing if you're not sure of what value to use), and click OK.

As you can tell from this explanation, I'm not a big believer in the "rule" to resize in 10% increments (often referred to as stairstep interpolation). I could easily

argue either position, either for or against, and be (I think) equally convincing). The bottom line is that one-step interpolation is actually quite effective. The only time I've seen a real appreciable difference using stairstep interpolation was when Unsharp Mask was applied partway through the process, and even then the difference was really quite minor especially when compared to the one-step interpolation with appropriate sharpening applied after the fact.

As for third-party tools like Genuine Fractals (www.ononesoftware.com), I find them to be very good, but generally unnecessary. The major benefit (in my mind) to Genuine Fractals is that it provides a much more user-friendly experience for resizing your images, asking you "real" questions about the image and output rather than asking you to enter a bunch of numbers. However, I don't find the results to be significantly better than the Bicubic interpolation in Photoshop (better, but not significantly, and I don't think most viewers could really see a difference in the final print).
